


#### Sylvanian Families Starry Point Lighthouse £59.99

# 'Tis the season to hit the slopes by Paul Wojnicki



#### Book with a reputable operator

With the recent demise of Monarch still fresh in traveller's memories, it's reassuring to book with one of the big hitters when planning a skiing/snowboarding holiday. I always use Crystal as they're part of the TUI group, who will not be going out of business any time in the next century. They also have an excellent reputation for family ski holidays and were recently awarded 'Best Tour Operator' by the World Snow Awards. Some of the outstanding factors in this award were Crystal's excellent family friendly brochures and website, which recognises that we mums and dads need very detailed information and support before booking a ski holiday. Don't take my word for it though, download or order their brochure and you'll find all the ski school and childcare information you'll need upfront, enabling you to plan the perfect holiday for vour needs.

## Head north for guaranteed snow and non-skiing activities

Last year I wrote about an amazing trip to Ruka in Finland. Harrison, who was three at the time, hasn't stopped talking about it since. I wouldn't be much of a travel writer however if we visited the same destination every year, so this year we've booked Vemdalen in Sweden. We wanted a destination in the far north because it guarantees snow, and there's no worry of the kids struggling with altitude. Sweden and Finland also offer a range of other child friendly options if the kids don't take to skiing as well as you hoped. Dog sledding is fantastic fun and requires no lessons, reindeer rides are a relaxed way of enjoying the snow, and of course there are always plenty of free sledging opportunities if the kids don't enjoy skiing.

## Visit Chill Factore for at least one lesson before you travel

It's a good idea to try a skiing or snowboarding lesson before you decide to book a skiing holiday, though holidays to winter wonderlands are often fun for non-skiers. Chill Factore have a range of options for families wanting to try out the slopes or hone their skills in anticipation of that big winter holiday. Taster sessions cost as little as £22 for younger visitors and take place on a gentle beginner slope. They are an ideal introduction for children- and adults - who have never skied or snowboarded before.

We couldn't decide between a Fun Taster or a private lesson but we opted with the latter because Harrison and I wanted to learn together and the mixed adult and child taster sessions are designed for kids aged 6+. At fifty minutes, the private lesson was slightly shorter than the fun taster sessions but we got the undivided attention of our instructor, more runs on the slopes and consequently learned a lot quicker. Our instructor Amanda had Harrison skiing after about twenty minutes, though there were one or two tumbles along the way of course. We had an amazing time and Harrison has been pestering me to take him back ever since. Three year old Ella was disappointed that she wasn't yet old enough to join us on the slopes, but Alena took her to Chill Factore's Mini Moose Land- next to the slopes- where she had a whale of a time playing in the snow, navigating the ice maze and sledging down a mini hill on a rubber ring. All in all, Chill Factore was a fantastic day out and was the highlight of the school holidays for us all, while whetting everyone's appetite for our trip to Sweden in Winter.

## Pick a resort with slopes close to your accommodation

It goes without saying that skiing holidays can get a little chilly. Layers help, as does a good quality snow suit, but you'd be well advised to pick accommodation that's close to the slopes if you've got younger children. That way you can have a couple of hours in the snow in the morning, take lunch in your hotel and have another couple of hours in the afternoon. We booked Sörgårdarna Apartments in Vemdalen as they are in a central and super convenient location only a 1-minute walk to the slopes and 2 minutes walk to the resort centre. The apartments also have their own cooking facilities, which always helps to keep costs down, and there was a traditional Swedish sauna in each room to warm us up afterwards.

#### Consider weeks other than New Year and February half term

These weeks are the most popular with families but that means they are the most expensive and the busiest. Christmas week and Easter holidays are at the extreme ends of the ski season but you're still quaranteed snow if you travel somewhere like Sweden.

#### Oh, and don't forget sun protection

Skin and eye protection is just as important on a skiing holiday as it is on a summer one. Sunshine dancing off the snow can easily burn sensitive skin so a high factor sun screen is essential. It can also be dazzling so wear sunglasses or goggles, which are less likely to fall off and get lost.

# Eat like a king! Baklava recipe from Food Sorcery

Do you feel adventurous this Christmas? Do you feel like having something unusual for your festive table? Something that you can make in your own kitchen together with your kids?

Baklava is a Mediterranean treat that came to us through centuries and countries. Its luxurious taste still prompts a saying "we are not rich enough to eat baklava every day" - it was a special treat for kings and dignitaries at one point in history and has been served for various traditional celebrations right through till our days. Christmas is one of them. M&D asked Food Sorcery of Didsbury for their recipe. One which you can use for Christmas and beyond, prepare single headedly or together with your family; and use to surprise your guests with the ancient mastery and modern simplicity of your baking.

**Preparation time** - Approx 30 mins **Cooking time** - 30 mins to 1 hour **Serves** - Makes 25 - 30 pieces

#### Ingredients

18 sheets ready-made filo pastry (unwrap and keep under a damp tea-towel until you are ready to use); 150g unsalted butter, you'll need extra for greasing;



200g chopped nuts (almonds, walnuts, or pistachios are best, or use a combination of them);

2 tbsp granulated sugar; 1 tsp ground cardamon

#### For the syrup

300g granulated sugar; 250ml water; 1 tbsp lemon juice; 340g of honey; 1 cinnamon stick; Finely ground pistachios for garnish (optional).

#### Method

- 1 Preheat the oven to 180C / 350F /Gas 4.
- **2** Grease a 17 x 28cm (11 x 7in) baking tray with butter.

- **3** Melt the remaining butter in a saucepan over low heat or in a microwave.
- **4** Lay 10 sheets of filo pastry, one at a time, into the tray, brushing each sheet with butter before adding the next.
- **5** In a clean bowl, mix together the nuts, sugar and cardamon and spread the mixture over the pastry in the tray.
- **6** Layer up the remaining sheets on top of the nut mixture, brushing each sheet with butter, as before.
- **7** Using a sharp knife, cut into the top layers of the pastry to make small squares.
- **8** Place baklava in the preheated oven for approximately 30-35 minutes, or until lightly golden brown, and edges appear slightly crisp. Remove and allow to cool slightly.
- **9** For the syrup, heat the sugar, water, lemon juice, honey and cinnamon stick in a small saucepan and bring to the boil, then reduce to medium low heat and let simmer for 7 minutes until slightly thickened. Remove the cinnamon stick.
- **10** Pour the syrup over the baklava and leave to cool. Garnish with some finely crushed pistachios if desired and Cut into small pieces to serve.

# It's free to party! Top homemade Christmas Party Games



Here, The Money Shop share five of their favourite homemade Christmas party games, all of which can be made at next to no cost at all.

#### Christmas Charades

Everyone loves a game of charades, and you can easily stick to a strictly Christmas theme.

If you've never played before (in which case, where have you been?!), then here's what you'll need to do: firstly, create a list of Christmas themed songs, carols and films, and put them into a hat.

Next, separate yourself into pairs, and nominate someone to go first. They must pick a term at random, and then act it out without speaking, whilst the other teams guess what it is.

The team who has the most points when all of the terms have been acted out wins!

#### Pin the Nose on Rudolph

Pin the tail on the donkey just got a festive makeover. Get the kids to draw their best reindeer, whilst you cut out a nose from red paper.

Next, take it in turns to try and pin the nose on Rudolph whilst blindfolded (no peeking!).

The person who gets the nose closest to the right place wins. To extend the game, play multiple rounds, awarding a point to each person who wins the round, with the first person to reach three points the winner.

#### Find Santa's Friends

This is definitely one the kids will love! All you need are some festive-themed chocolates, which you can pick up cheaply from the supermarket. Hide the chocolates in various places round the house, and give each child their own mini-stocking, before letting them loose to find them all!

#### Snowball Slam

This game is sure to bring out the competitive side in the whole family, designed by Crystal Underwood, writer and creator of 'Growing a Jeweled Rose' (www.growingajeweledrose.com), a website packed with fun and educational activities for children. Start by styling Styrofoam cups into snowmen using felt, glue, and your imagination. Next, you'll need to locate a 'snowball' - a small beanbag or a ball will be just fine. Once you've stacked the Styrofoam cups into a pyramid, take it in turns to throw the snowball and see how many cups you can knock over.

You can also amend this game into Christmas bowling, abandoning the beanbag in favour of a ball, and arranging the snowmen like skittles.

#### Christmas Scattergories

This is another classic game that's been given a festive spin. You can either make your own list, or print off a readymade themed list from www.mypartygames.com

Once you've all got a copy, pick a letter at random and try to answer as many things on the list as possible in the time given. For instance, if the letter chosen is J, you may want to answer the Christmas-themed song with 'Jingle Bell Rock'. When the timer has run out, go through your answers, with every unique answer scoring a point. After three rounds (using a different letter each time), add up your points and the highest scorer wins.

These games will help to keep your whole family occupied this Christmas, without anyone reaching for their phone or tablet once!

## Christmas? by Sandi Mann

As a mum of three, I must say that, come January, already feel nostalgic about the lazy festive period when most of us are happy to let our kids be 'freerange'. It is always sobering when the strict bedtime routines kick in again, the alarm clock is set and the chocolate and sweets go back into the treat cupboard. But, as a psychologist, I believe that the whole reason that we love the freedom of the festive season is because it is in such contrast to the rest of the year. We may wish it could be Christmas every day, but if it were, there would actually be no Christmas at all. Studies have shown that we appreciate things more when they are scarce; eating chocolate all day, every day would not actually give us more pleasure than eating it once a day when we would savour it more.

I also strongly believe that kids need structure and that rules and routine help them make sense of their world. But, I also think we can take a leaf out of the 'free-range parents' book by chilling out a bit too; giving children choice and allowing them to make their own mistakes can foster independence. Today, too many parents are both cotton wooling their kids far too much (apparently, British parents are the strictest of all nations) and imposing so much structure that they don't have the time or ability to make their own choices, to get bored, to create their own fun or to problem-solve. In my book The Science of Boredom (Little Brown) I argue that kids need downtime and today's helicopter parent does not provide enough of this.

So, if at the end of the free-range season you are preparing to return to your usual hectic and exhausting diary that keeps your kids busy (and super-safe) from dawn to dusk, perhaps it's time to downtime their schedule. I'm not suggesting abandoning school, or bedtime, or proper meals, but, actually, it is just possible that those relaxed and chilled-out free-range parents can teach the rest of us a thing or two - and not just at Christmas.

Tis the season to be jolly but tis also the season to relax, chill and forget about bedtimes, routine and the usual regimes. In fact, one of the best things about the whole festive period for many parents is that, for around 7-10 days, the rule book is nowhere to be seen - buried, under an avalanche of wrapping paper, tinsel and glitter and not to resurface until the New Year. Who doesn't love the late nights, snuggled in front of the TV watching a family film whilst little hands dip stickily into boxes of Quality Street? Who isn't enamoured by the lazy lie-ins, untroubled by piercing alarm clocks, as we all emerge dreamily from the cosy caves of our duvets when we (or, most likely, our tummies) feel like it? Which parent doesn't relish the pleasure in being Chilled Out Mum or Dad who languidly turns a blind eye to the sugar consumption that is dominating their children's nutritional intake?

This, after all, is what the festive season is all about. No school, no rules, no regulations. Tis the season for free-range parenting.

For some parents however, this relaxed style of parenting is not a temporary measure and does not start and end with the festive season. For an increasing number of families in the UK, free-range or 'hands-off' parenting is a lifestyle, not a season. For them, there is no school (home-schooling takes

preference), no set bedtimes, no set structure and few rules. The emphasis is a child-centred approach where kids make their own choices and make their own mistakes - and learn to live with the consequences. Thus, a child can choose to stay up till 2am but they will learn that doing so makes them feel tired and grouchy the next day - so they will learn to choose a different bedtime themselves, without that rule being imposed on them externally.

The issue of free-range parenting reached the popular conscience in March this year when so-called 'off the grid' parents, Matt and Adele Allen, from Brighton, allowed their nappy-free one year old to relieve herself live on the set of This Morning. Parents were quick to condemn their off-road parenting style but interest in it is growing; recently a Channel 4 documentary explored so-called 'feral families' whose kids can't read or write at the age of 14, and who were pictured brandishing knives and helping themselves to ice cream at 2 in the morning. It all made for entertaining TV and allowed the chattering masses to tut tut their way across twitter, but is free range parenting really so bad?



# Born to Dance by Tanya J D

As soon as I reached the tender age of three, my parents decided that, like every good little Russian girl, I must be packed off to ballet classes lest the golden opportunity to turn me into a prima ballerina be missed. They showed some leniency however, in allowing me to choose my own dancing establishment, which I am told I went about doing in no uncertain manner. The first school we tried, I allegedly burst into tears when I was invited to join in, and firmly refused to even consider. But I fell in love with the second school: The South Manchester School of Dance. I think this was because, even at such a young age, I could sense that this was the kind of place where an uncoordinated, chronically chubby girl with more enthusiasm than actual skill would be encouraged and nurtured just as much as a lanky, graceful, natural dancer.

My three-year-old self turned out to have great intuition. South Manchester Dance School was the kind of place where everyone was always welcome, regardless of age, appearance, and initial ability. The emphasis was very much on the learning process, on technique and a shared love of dancing, rather than on streamlining everyone into the mould of a perfect ballerina.

It seems clear that nothing has changed since my dancing days. The school is still an eclectic mix of young and old, nearly professional and hopelessly bewildered, tall, short and everything in between. I decided to have a chat with the principal, Denise Cornall (herself an old teacher of mine) to find out a little about the diverse range of students currently learning to plie and pirouette under her watchful eye.

It turns out that the age span of pupils attending the school at the moment reaches a grand total of 60 years. The youngest, at 3 years old, can be found shaking a tail feather in the recently renamed Debut Dance classes, while the oldest (whose age must be deduced as I shan't spell it out) dances up a storm in the Recreational ballet classes. The recreational ballet classes are, in fact, a perfect example of the South Manchester Dance School ethos. They are especially designed to accommodate those who are returning to ballet after leaving it behind for some time, those who, like so many, gave it up as a teenager and ended up severely regretting their decision.

One of those who returned to ballet after leaving it behind during her adolescent years is Rachel, who has been loving Recreational classes so much, that she kept up her attendance right the way through her recent pregnancy. She started taking classes at South Manchester 12 years ago, because she wanted to keep fit but found going to the gym boring, and felt like it would be much easier to drag herself off the sofa after a long day at work to do something she really enjoyed. And it certainly seems to have worked she was still dancing at 39 weeks and 4 days - bump and baby in tow! She decided that she would listen to her body and keep going with ballet in pregnancy for as long as she felt able to, and was pleasantly surprised to find that she was able to maintain her balance in class despite her growing bump and ever-changing centre of gravity. Ballet even seems to have helped Rachel with some of those horrible pregnancy sideeffects - she explains:

"For me, it's the combination of music and movement and how it is all encompassing - the way you can lose yourself in it. This was a particularly good thing in the earlier part of my pregnancy when I was feeling nauseous a lot of the time - not sure if it actually stopped me from feeling sick or if I was just too bust concentrating on the steps and timing and my own posture to notice any nausea".



There can be no doubt - ballet is a unique form of exercise - it keeps you healthy whilst also honing your musicality, posture and concentration. It welcomes the young, the old, and everybody in between. Once you start dancing, you never really stop. In the words of the current principal of the dance school:

"I have witnessed the sheer exhilaration time and time again, of ladies who put their ballet shoes away when they went to university or had children and have found their way to ballet class again. The moment the plie music begins you see joy wash over their expression; returning to a place of their childhood dreams and sheer relief at using muscles that haven't had any exercise in a while!"

Rachel has already expressed a keen desire to pack her newborn baby boy Edward Emmanuel off to ballet classes as soon as he has found his feet. What better place to introduce him to this discipline, in equal measure rigorous and rewarding, than the South Manchester Dance School, which will welcome him with open arms into a world filled with the most diverse people, all united by their love of ballet.

And what about me? Now that I'm no longer under the watchful eye of my parents, being carted off in the family car every Saturday - do I still love to dance? Do you really have to ask?

# Splat with your siblings by Rachael Cooper, Splat Messy Play, East Cheshire

Speaking to parents who attend SPLAT classes, there are always two reasons why they go. It's about letting their children explore and create and get messy (and not having to do all this at home!) AND it's a place where their little ones can play together, learn together and build their imagination, together.

I know, as a mum, there are lots of classes locally that provide sports, arts, music and language activities but there are not many that aren't age restricted, potentially separating siblings and making it difficult for parents to choose classes. With messy play there's no right or wrong way to 'do it', meaning children can build their imagination together with siblings and peers. Whilst one kicks about in the playdough squelching it in her toes, her older brother is making me a pizza with the playdough (something we do weekly in Timperley!) It's fab to see mums watching their children make, create and have fun together.


Messy play has a crucial role in brain development in the early years of childhood. The brain is more adaptable and susceptible when we're young so we have the ability to be more imaginative and creative with new and different experiences. This creativity leads to innovation and problem





solving but unfortunately children's exposure to sensory play opportunities is declining. Even though creativity is one of the highest soughtafter skills that employers look for, research shows a drop in creativity in young children since the 90s as they spend more time glued to a screen rather than fostering important creative play skills with siblings and peers.

With the holiday season edging closer, I'm grabbing hold of imagination with two firm hands; jumping in muddy puddles, firework painting, biscuit decorating and snowflake making. Why not come get creative too?



# Open-ended toys for open-minded children



Parents will be looking for that perfect toy for their children this Christmas, but it is easy to be overwhelmed by the range of choices. Soon, shops will be filled with electronic games and brightly coloured gadgets, so how can we ensure that what we are spending on toys is buying the best for our children?

One factor to take into consideration is that children learn through play, so the toys and activities we expose them to will have an important role in their mental and physical development. Real play is about creativity, exploration, discovery, and spontaneity. Many studies show that play is crucial to child development and that children benefit most when parents spend quality time playing with their offspring.

Building up blocks and knocking them down, or pushing toy cars along an imaginary street is developmentally essential for all children. By choosing the right kinds of toys, parents can help children get the most out of their playtime. The best toys are often the simplest. Toys that allow children to direct the play themselves are not only more engaging for young children, they're also more powerful stimulants for development. Genuine creative play will be ninety percent of the child with ten percent provided by the toy.

One definition of open-ended toys is that they engage children's imagination and so have the potential to be different every time a child plays with them. So parents may wish to assess that potential when looking for toys that will encourage open-ended play. They may wish to consider the toys that children have played with for centuries since there are good developmental reasons why those toys have remained popular for so long. The reason why some toys are so good for play and learning is that they require a lot more thinking and creativity on the part of the child since in open-ended play they are using all aspects of their development. Jigsaw puzzles, for example, engage motor skills, problem-solving abilities, perceptual skills and language skills as the child talks through the process with an adult.

# So what might we consider when choosing toys?

Is it age appropriate?
Most toys are labelled to indicate for which ages they are appropriate. Of course, there is always some overlap and when choosing toys for their own children, parents know best whether a toy will be well received or not. Children should be encouraged to play together, so choosing toys that children can share and play with together helps to encourage social skills and imagination. For those aged under 3, it is important to follow the advice on the packaging since many toys have small pieces that can pose a danger to young children.

## Does it fit with the child's interests?

Children show their interests from a very young age. Some love animals, others may enjoy a particular cartoon character or may show curiosity about music or outer space. Choosing toys that relate to the child's current interests is usually a safe option, since it helps satisfy, enhance and extend that existing interest.

#### Does it encourage creativity?

Children explore their creativity when they play with toys and choosing toys that target their imaginations enables their inventiveness to flourish. Today, when more and more time is spent passively in front of screens, and 30% of under 3s have their own tablets largely teaching them to follow instructions,

toys that encourage active, creative explorations help children to learn about themselves and their world

#### Is it open-ended?

Open-ended toys are those that can be used in many and various ways depending on the child, the day, their imagination, and their wishes. They foster play, creativity, imagination and inventiveness. The more ways a child can find to play with a toy, the more he/she will learn from it.

#### Does it have educational value?

Educational toys are not only fun, but they can also help children learn new things in an interesting way. When children use the same toy over and over again for the same purpose they slowly gain confidence in their abilities, which aids their learning and development. The best educational toys should promote different aspects of a child's learning and development, including: creativity, imagination, coordination, motor skills, stimulation, physical development, problem solving, social skills, reading and writing, confidence and discovering the world.

#### Is it appropriate and practical?

Children must be physically able to manipulate and play with the features of the toy and understand how to use it. Parents will want to be sure that their child's current play needs and interests are met by the toy. They will also wish to satisfy themselves that the toy is safe for the uses to which the child will put it.

Parents notice how children can be more interested in the box the toy came in than the toy itself, yet it takes courage for parents to choose toys that don't talk, zoom, or flash, but do provide other, amazing benefits for children. This Christmas, perhaps we could all look for toys which don't provide our children with all the answers, all the words and all the pictures, but leave room for them to invent and develop their own ideas. We might even encourage children when they decide there is more fun to be had with the paper and boxes their presents came in. Or, perhaps we could arrange for some of the present boxes to contain more boxes and papers, cards, string, clips, pegs, paints and glues, and all the other vehicles which allow their imaginations to take flight.



is neither too hard nor too easy and is the level at which optimal learning is enabled.

To achieve this the staff will carry out honest and accurate diagnostic assessments to ascertain the exact learning needs of your child on entry and these will provide the teachers with targets to work towards.

The staff at the school are all passionate about meeting the exact individual needs of every child. All the teachers have a proven track record of success in teaching children with additional needs and have spent many years working in a wide variety of schools in the Greater Manchester area.

The school is unique in offering a choice between full time places of 4 days a week or the option of flexi schooling where children attend for 2 days.

# To tutor or not to tutor? That is the question - a parent's viewpoint

As a child I was tutored. As a parent I have tutored my child and now and again I've turned to a tutor instead of falling out with my daughter! As a teacher, I can see the merits when a child is being supported by a tutor whom they enjoy being taught by.

The key to successful tutoring is you as a parent assessing how tutoring will help your child, not because you are trying to fill gaps in what their school is doing or not doing, but instead ensuring that it is a supplementary addition to what happens at home and at school.

I named home first because, particularly if we are parents of children in private education, we sometimes assume that because we are paying for our child's education, this automatically means we do not have to do any extra learning with our children at home as the school should be taking full responsibility for our child's learning. This leads to huge gaps and missed opportunities in learning.


As a parent, tutoring for me started at home and it began when my daughter was just a year old. It was speaking to her like she was a small person, rather than using baby talk; using our long car journeys as an opportunity to help her analyse and enjoy the world around her. I call this 'verbal comprehension', where you ask your children what they see, what they can hear and help them build their dictionary of words. Comprehension skills are therefore being first taught well before a child starts formal education. My daughter first started to work on these skills when she first started to look around and analyse the world. I would have real conversations with her asking her why she thought something was the way it was. Without even realising it, she was going through 'tutoring' - and it didn't cost me a penny!

I can only talk from personal experience. I have been called a 'tiger mum' which I have laughed off, and then gone back to the 'drawing board'. Assessing the situation I realised that I have a very happy, emotionally stable and well-mannered child. I did teach

her to sit down with her mama for 'Learning Time' at the age of 3, but she has learnt how to learn, how to concentrate in small chunks and to enjoy her learning through play which was the beginning of our beautiful journey of discovery.

As a teacher I believe that when children get older tutoring becomes even more important, and part of it may - and sometimes should be - delegated to a professional tutor. Your child may struggle with maths, and maths may not be your chosen subject. If we are not confident in a subject, whether it is maths, science or English, children will pick up on our tension and lack of confidence. By outsourcing that subject to the right tutor, who your child enjoys sitting with, you are helping your child to enjoy that subject and build up confidence. This becomes even more important when your child enters the stage of retaining and processing exam skills and preparing for High school.
